DIRECTOR' S REPORT

Technology - The library has received a Pocketalk two-way translation device from the Nassau County Central and Co-Central Libraries. Our Technology Department has trained the Reference staff to beta test this product. If it proves beneficial in aiding communication with the public, then we are able to order additional devices at a discounted price.

We have applied for a Long Island Library Resources Council (LILRC) technology assistance grant. We are hoping to receive reimbursement for an additional network switch dedicated to providing WiFi access to the public, ensuring uptime and the capacity for large volumes of traffic.

Building and Grounds - The Meeting Room was freshly painted by library custodial staff. Carpets were cleaned by Rainbow Maintenance and Cleaning. Inter-County Mechanical replaced a burnt spade terminal on HVAC 1 and replaced all HVAC filters. Inter-County Mechanical and Ainsworth/Delta determined there is a malfunctioning unit board on HVAC 6 that needs to be replaced. Our BMS system which controls the HVAC units was updated, which has resulted in more efficient HVAC operations throughout the library. Corkrey Electric replaced ballasts in the second floor Reference area to restore light.

Overdrive - The Great Courses have been added into OverDrive/Libby. In the Libby App, patrons can scroll down to the 'Extras' section and follow the prompts to collect a pass to access the collection.

Insurance - In working with the Regan Agency, Inc. we were able to switch insurance to Utica National Insurance Group for better coverage and cost savings which will benefit the library.

Windows/Doors & Theater- The library building is over 30 years old with leaky windows, doors, and items in need of updates. The Board has approved moving forward with necessary building repairs and improvements to be paid for with existing capital funds. The bid was approved and awarded to AFL General Construction. Mr. Munoz Ospina, Head of Technology, and myself attended a meeting with BBS Architects, SCC Construction Management, and AFL General Construction to discuss next steps. We have notified the community of the upcoming work to be done. Patrons can check our progress by visiting the library website. (www.jericholibrary.org/workzone) Information can also be found on signage throughout the library, flyers at the public facing desks, and social media. There will be a phone message once the work is ready to begin. Ms. Cinquemani has contacted the Jericho School District, and they will assist with sending this information to our Jericho families and students.

MUSEUM PASSES- The library has added two new museum passes per patron request- The Jewish Museum and 9/11 Memorial & Museum.

REPRESENTATIVES- We had the pleasure of a visit from Senator Jack Martins, who delivered 125 free COVID tests for the Jericho community. They are available at the Circulation Desk while supplies last. I showed him the work being done to improve our theater with assistance from a SAM grant that had been awarded to us by former Senator James Gaughran. Funding is essential for us to maintain an aging building, and to be able to serve the community now and into the future. Assemblyman Jake Blumencranz is sponsoring Toys for Tots to provide gifts for children in need on Long Island. Legislator Arnie Drucker is sponsoring a coat drive for residents in need. Patrons can donate in our lobby.

LIBRARIES AND THE FUTURE- Mr. Munoz Ospina and myself attended this year's 'Annual Conference on Libraries and the Future: AI in Libraries' which raised a lot of important questions and thoughts about the future of libraries in the presentations about AI (Artificial Intelligence). Speaker Nick Tanzi noted that this is a disruptive technology akin to the creation of the world wide web and that such changes bring a lot of fear, but also there can be opportunity. Presentation topics included concern for intellectual property rights, the impacts on individual privacy, cybersecurity risks, and the potential for AI models to reduce social interaction, increase existing biases and the digital divide. How do libraries respond to these concerns and the changes AI will inevitably bring? How can they take advantage of any potential benefits? We will continue to be informed about this very timely subject and how it may affect future library services.

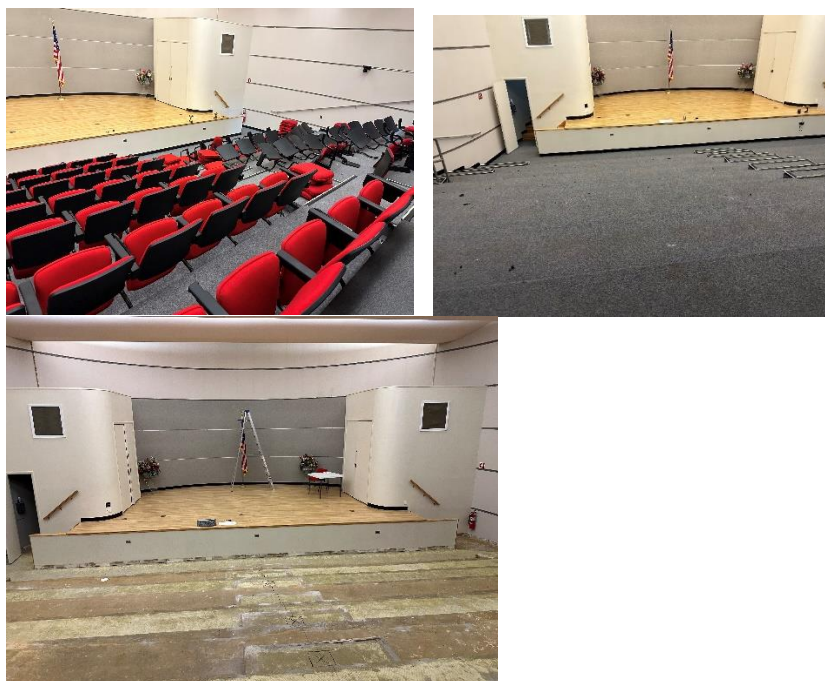
JERICOH SCHOOL DISTRICT- The library is in receipt of tax and PILOT checks from the Jericho School District (JUFSD). These funds support the library and our services to the community. I attended the October Jericho Wellness Coalition Meeting to hear about the district's student health and wellness initiatives for this year and to support their efforts. They are offering many programs for students including wellness days and activities, and Northwell trainings for students and their families. Many students visit the library after school and we aim to provide library programming and resources to assist them in all areas.

TECHNOLOGY- The library has purchased Pocketalk two-way translation devices (at the Nassau libraries discounted price) for each public service desk. Mr. Munoz Ospina and our Technology team are training Jericho Library staff in the use of this product to aid communication with the public. Each Pocketalk device includes audio translation for 82 languages. Saturn Business Systems replaced old network switches with a new and more efficient Aruba system.

BUILDING & GROUNDS- The inner and outer automatic doors in the lobby were not opening and closing properly. MacKenzie Automatic Doors made the necessary adjustments to get them working again. HVAC unit 6 was not communicating with the computer system. Inter-County Mechanical replaced an RTRM board and got the unit back online.

NASSAU LIBRARY SYSTEM MEMBER LIBRARY SUPPORT- The library pays member library support to the Nassau Library System (NLS) and receives key services which include interlibrary loan/materials delivery, NYS Annual Report support, NYS Construction aid support, continuing education for staff and Trustees (and more). Member Library support is calculated based on 4 factors: Population, Materials Expenditures, Cardholders, and Circulation. Documentation is attached for Board review and vote.

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS- The library building is over 30 years old with leaky windows, doors, and items in need of updates. The Board has approved moving forward with necessary building repairs and improvements to be paid for with existing capital funds. We will be receiving reports every two weeks from the construction team and I am directing them to coordinate weekly job meetings for us to discuss progress. Information on the project is being posted to the Jericho Library website at www.jericholibrary.org/workzone. The Jericho community has been notified of the construction via signage, flyers, our web site, phone message, and social media. I have contacted the Jericho School District for their assistance in sending this information to our Jericho families and students. To date: old seating and carpet have been removed from the theater in preparation for electrical work, new carpet, new theater seating, and handrails. Shrubbery at the front of the library has been removed and transplanted in preparation for hardscaping to eliminate leaks. Starting the week of 11/13 the back parking lot will be closed to install safety guardrails. We are excited for the community to enjoy the result of these repairs and improvements when completed. Many thanks to staff members Mr. Munoz Ospina and Mr. Valencia for their valuable assistance during this time.

2024 and 2025 Member Library Support

Request for Approval by Member Library Boards by December 5, 2023

NLS is requesting member library board approval of member library support for calendar years 2024 and 2025. Since 2014, NLS has used a four-factor formula to calculate each library's share that gives equal weight to population, cardholders, materials expenditures, and net circulation. NLS relies on the libraries' Annual Reports to NYS for the data used in the calculations, as well as ILS reports for components of the cardholder and circulation data. NLS has not effected an increase in the total amount of member library support since 2013. With this proposal we seek a modest increase of \$25,000 phased in over two years, which amounts to 1.19% per year. The attached charts fully explicate the following proposal:

- **Two-year deal for 2024 + 2025** so libraries have stable and predictable obligations.
- **\$25,000 increase phased in over two years**, for a total request of \$1,075,000 in 2025.
- **Use of a three-year average for each of the factors in the formula.** In this proposal we have used an average of 2020, 2021, and 2022 data (the most recent annual reports available) for each of the factors in the formula. (The average is not necessary for the population factor, as the chartered population of each library district is static for 10 years.) This prevents single-year anomalies in libraries' circumstances from causing dramatic shifts in their calculations. We began using three-year averages in the calculation of ILS fees and member library support in 2020, based on the recommendation of participating libraries.
- **A two-year implementation of the new amounts for individual libraries.** This means that the impact of any increase is spread over the course of two years, with half of the increase implemented in 2024 and the full increase in 2025. Likewise, half of any reduction would be implemented in 2024 and the full reduction would be realized in 2025. This is what has been done in the past without objections by the libraries.

Member library support of NLS supports services to member libraries that are not mandated by the State, including delivery service. In the past two years NLS has launched important new projects, such as the Techmobile and marketing campaigns like the Nassau Library Tour. Other services supported by this funding are: administration of the OverDrive consortium and database coordinated orders; original cataloging; E-rate assistance; NLS staff-mediated out-of-system interlibrary loans; continuing education and training offered by NLS; NLS email accounts for member libraries and/or their staff; hosting libraries' websites; and website design, enhancement and problem-solving assistance. Following the attached charts is a document

outlining the services withheld from member libraries not in good standing, should they choose not to pay member library support. Currently all member libraries are in good standing.

SUSPENSION OF NLS SERVICES TO MEMBER LIBRARIES NOT IN GOOD STANDING

Libraries that do not pay their share of member library support of NLS that has been approved by at least a majority of member library boards will be considered to be not in good standing.

1. NLS will not **host** the library's **web site**.
2. NLS will not provide **website design** and **maintenance assistance**.
3. NLS will not provide **email accounts** for the library and/or its staff.
4. NLS will not provide **original cataloging** for any items for which adequate copy cataloging records are unavailable.
5. NLS will not provide **E-rate reimbursement assistance**.
[EXCEPTION: NLS will continue to prepare and submit a joint application for all member libraries participating in NLS' ILS and Associated Services.]
6. NLS will not provide **grant proposal assistance**.
[EXCEPTION: NLS will provide assistance with library applications for grant programs offered by the State Library / DLD for which all member libraries of public library systems are eligible as well as for State Construction Aid.]
7. The staffs, directors and trustees of a library not in good standing will not be allowed to participate in NLS sponsored or arranged **continuing education (CE) without charge if NLS paid fees for outside presenter. The fee for participation in this will vary based of the cost of the outside presenter**.
[EXCEPTION: State grant or aid program funded CE or CE provided as part of a state mandate such as coordinated outreach services or in support of state requirements for libraries (such as annual reports to the state and compliance with minimum standards) will continue to be open to all member libraries. These CE opportunities are provided by NLS without charge.]
8. NLS staff will not **facilitate a community-based planning process**.
9. NLS will not provide **staff-mediated interlibrary loan** service.
10. NLS will not provide **delivery service** to a library not in good standing. Such a library must pick up from and return items to the NLS Service Center. This includes items borrowed or loaned via LLink.
11. Libraries not in good standing may not participate in the **Premium Level** group subscription to **Tutor.com's online homework assistance**.
12. Libraries not in good standing may not participate in the **NLS NDD Consortium for access to downloadable ebooks and audiobooks** via OverDrive.
13. Libraries not in good standing may not participate in the **discounted subscriptions to databases and online services that are not in the Core Collection** that are offered by NLS.
14. Libraries not in good standing may not participate in **NLS' Core Collection of Databases**.
