DIRECTOR'S REPORT

NASSAU LIBRARY SYSTEM - Mr. Weinstock and Ms. Cinquemani attended the virtual 2023 NLS Annual Meeting with guest speaker Mr. Aaron Terr, Director of Public Advocacy at the Foundation for Individual Rights and Expression (FIRE), a nonpartisan nonprofit dedicated to defending and sustaining the individual rights of all Americans to free speech and free thought. Mr. Terr presented *Shelf Censorship: Preserving Public Libraries as Free Speech Sanctuaries*. Ms. Mars was re-elected as trustee, and Ms. Ashby, Director of NLS, reviewed the proposed NLS budget for 2024.

The Jericho Library Board of Trustees is invited to attend the NLS Board Meeting on February 26, 2024. Ms. Cinquemani will send out further information next month.

January 9, 2024

NLS has provided copies of the *Handbook for Library Trustees of New York State, 2023 edition*. Each trustee will be given a copy.

NLS is distributing funds received from New York State from the 'Love Your Library Fund' (https://www.nysl.nysed.gov/libdev/lylplate/). Each member library will receive a \$100 grant to help support children's summer reading, along with double-sided lawn signs that welcome patrons to the 2024 Adventure Begins at Your Library Summer Reading Program. The lawn signs will be sent in early spring.

SOCIAL MEDIA - X (formerly Twitter) is a social media platform. Ms. Cinquemani would like to discuss with the Board whether we should continue to market the library on this platform. Only 38 percent of libraries are actively marketing on X.

BUILDING & GROUNDS - Corkrey Electric Services installed LED soffit lighting, replaced ballasts, and replaced fluorescent ceiling lighting with LED fixtures on the second floor. Inter-County Mechanical removed, replaced a defective main control board, and installed a new gas valve on HVAC 6. They tested all communication and the unit is now back online and operating. The compressor on the wall mounted air handler in the custodial area seized and is no longer working. We are determining the most cost-effective method of bringing heating and cooling back into the area.

NCPD/FBI- Ms. Cinquemani attended an FBI information sharing meeting targeted to libraries which gave an overview of cybersecurity awareness, foreign malign influence, homeland security and active shooter response with NCPD Homeland Security. Library directors can reach out with any questions or schedule free situational awareness training for staff. It is important to have these resources available to us at the library.

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS - The library building is over 30 years old with leaky windows, doors, and items in need of updates. The Board has approved moving forward with necessary building repairs and improvements to be paid for with existing capital funds. Please see attached progress report from SCC Construction Management. Construction progress has been posted to the library website at www.jericholibrary.org/workzone. Theater carpeting was originally delayed due to a manufacturing error but was finally delivered and installed. Aisle lighting is complete except for a defective part that will be fixed. Railings are being installed, and the next step is the installation of new comfortable seating. Our goal is to have the theater ready for our first theater program of the year on January 14th. We are excited for the community to enjoy the results of these repairs and improvements. Many thanks to staff members Mr. Munoz Ospina, Mr. Valencia, and Mr. Gomez for their valuable assistance during this time.

Our Theater is now operational and patrons have been enjoying performances in the new and improved space. The next phase of work will be the replacement of old and leaking windows with new energy efficient and cost-efficient windows. Our information center on the second floor will be updated to include additional seating and space for the public. We will be communicating details to the public as we get further updates from our construction team.



JERICHO SCHOOL DISTRICT- I attended a Jericho Wellness Coalition meeting at the Jericho schools. They discussed many wonderful programs that include: LEAD program (learning, empathy, acknowledging, diversity), PS I love you Day, Jericho Cares donations sponsored by the PTA, wellness days and activities, and Narcan training which is in high demand from students and parents. Many Jericho students use the library after school and into the evening, so we are always looking for ways to support the school initiatives.

Three Jericho staff members (Ms. Kim Simmons, Mr. Carlos Munoz Ospina, and Ms. Maria Heinz) attended the Jericho School District welcome night. They enjoyed speaking with all of the Jericho families and telling them about our library services.

SAFETY PLAN- Per New York State and Utica Insurance we have established a comprehensive safety management plan provided by RPF Associates. Staff will be given continual training and our safety committee will meet quarterly to conduct inspections and review the safety needs of the library.

FIRE DRILL- On January 17th we held staff safety training on emergency procedures, location of emergency exits and fire extinguishers, and AED locations.

RAVE APP- We offer the RAVE Panic Button Emergency Response App to library staff members and Trustees. This app can be used in a library emergency to provide critical information to staff and first responders. Users can also receive emergency notifications. Trustees may choose to be added to the system.

DELAYED OPENING/ EARLY CLOSING- On January 9th the library closed due to inclement weather and for safety of patrons and staff. On January 24th there was a delayed opening due to building maintenance.

BUILDING & GROUNDS- The wall mounted air handler in the custodial area is no longer working. Intercounty Mechanical Corp attached flex ductwork from the supply register to the custodial area to provide air to that office. We will see how this works before we replace the air handler. We had a roof leak by the Teen/non-fiction area and approximately 40 books were damaged. Eveready Enterprises Inc. sealed the wall flashing on the roof over the leak and the area around the drain.





ARTICLES- Some recent articles are featuring libraries. The JerEcho, Jericho High School's award-winning multimedia news site, recently posted *A Little Library Love*, a wonderful article that also featured an interview with our Children's librarian Ms. Kim Simmons. The American Library Association recently published a report with some surprising information about Millennial and Gen Z library use. They are using the library not only as a place to discover books, but as a safe and quiet space to be with their friends, or to relax and de-stress. Gen Z's who come to the library might not necessarily identify as readers, but will use other library services. And Gen Z's who do read prefer physical books.

Jericho Public Library Project Update

- Required submissions have been made to the Architect. They have been approved, including the windows. The only item outstanding are accessory for the brick installation which the contractor is currently working on submissions.
- Auditorium carpet has been installed and finished on 1-02-24. Punch-list items will be
 addressed now that a formal list was created. AFL will issue a schedule when they are
 going to make the necessary corrections as outlined by BBS. Attic stock of carpet
 remnants were given to the Library.
- Existing railings have been re-installed until new railing system arrives; Contractor has been sending emails on status of new material and keeping all parties informed on their responses. Still waiting on confirmation from vendor.
- The remaining interior work will be scheduled around the window installation to
 consolidate disturbance and down time. At this time, we are waiting for confirmation from
 window manufacturer on product completion along with shipment information to lock in
 dates for installation and abatement.
- On Monday January 29th a meeting to discuss logistics regarding the abatement plan related to the window portion of work took place, JC Broderick (environmental consultants was on site giving guidance on sequence and protocols for abatement relating to window system.
- On January 29th BBS conducted a punch list walk through for exterior hardscape & interior auditorium which since has been issued to the General Contractor.

A Little Library Love

The hushed whispers of students. The feel of crisp pages of a new copy. The colorful array of books stacked along wooden shelves. Libraries have always had a distinct presence that captivates their visitors. Today's libraries have helped both build and strengthen communities by connecting people and ideas. What once was thought of as just places for books, libraries have evolved to be places of comfort, learning and growth where we become a better version of ourselves. Their beauty can be seen through the eyes of a three-year-old sounding out her first words in a picture book, to a senior citizen enjoying the daily paper and some company.



The Jericho Public Library (JPL) has undergone many changes throughout the decades, with new programs, event, books and electronic resources. JPL children's librarian Ms. Kim Simmons feels that even if technology has changed, the heart of the library stays the same. She said, "Everything has

For decades, librarians have helped kids broaden their learning and explore any interests they might have. The resources they provide have had tremendous impacts on the knowledge and maturity children gain as they grow older alongside the library.

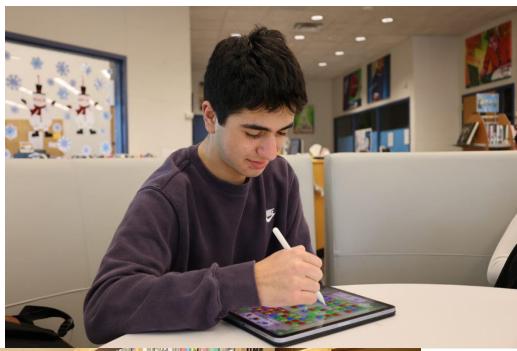
Jericho High School English teacher and avid lover of literature Ms. McGee believes that libraries played a pivotal role in her career choice. "They helped foster my love of reading, my desire to always be surrounded by books and also the desire to share that love. I think that's what's so wonderful about libraries, this idea of not just being a center of knowledge, but a place where it freely gives all of that knowledge to anyone who comes in its doors," she said.





The library is a staple for many teens in the Jericho community who like to spend their time studying in a calm environment.

Junior Joseph M. believes that libraries are a place of peace and quiet allowing for a better work atmosphere. "It's a much better studying environment, because it is quieter in most cases. You can concentrate a little bit more here," he said.





Jericho High School librarian Ms. Samira Salzberg believes that libraries treat each individual with equality, and adhere to their needs while providing access to resources that go beyond just books. "It's really a place where every member of the community can go and feel like they're being represented. They can go and get the information they need for personal use and educational use."

Not only does Ms. Salzberg help students in the library, she also helps teach students how to use databases and other online resources in their classrooms.





Social media has been a big part of our changing lives, affecting libraries as well. Solano County librarian and popular social content creator **Mychal Threets** uses Instagram to celebrate how libraries

have inspired many, old and young, with his stories, advice, and positive takes on the library. In our interview with him he said, "Library joy and book joy is what I've always felt as a kid, and that's why I do what I do—to create that same feeling in library kids and library grown-ups. That's why I take so much joy from the library stories that I share."

Libraries are much more than just places for books and reading. Most modern-day libraries offer a vast array of items and activities, ranging from board games to musical instruments. Mychal Threets has seen libraries grow for the past thirty years and has seen the wonderful opportunities they have been able to provide. He said, "There's eBooks, audiobooks; there's also musical instruments now, all sorts of really cool stuff. And then there's homework help and tutoring help. We're always waiting to find the perfect book for you, but in the meantime, there's something for everyone."





Jericho 4th grader Kazem K.'s family values the library so much that they even decided to bring that joy home with them, creating a designated library space in their house. Kazem loves his home, school and public libraries. He said, "The library is very comforting to me. I love libraries because I can go there with my friends and we can play together, use the iPads and find books. I can learn new things and it is really fun."

RESOLUTION JERICHO PUBLIC LIBRARY LIBRARY BOARD OF TRUSTEES FEBRUARY 13, 2024

Whereas, the adoption of the 2024/2025 budget for the Jericho Public Library may require a tax levy increase that exceeds the tax cap imposed by the state law as outlined in General Municipal Law Section 3-c adopted in 2011; and

Whereas, General Municipal Law Section 3-c expressly permits the library board to override the tax levy limit by a resolution approved by a vote of sixty percent of qualified board members; now therefore be it

Resolved, that the Board of Trustees of the Jericho Public Library voted and approved to exceed the tax levy limit for 2024/2025 by at least sixty percent of the Board of Trustees as required by state law on February 13, 2024.

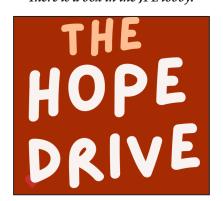
